HIS389H1-F Topics in History: Genocide in Rwanda: History, Violence, and Identity

This course examines the 1994 Rwandan Genocide, officially known as the 1994 Genocide Against the Tutsi, situated within larger historical frameworks of the nature of precolonial polities, the impact of colonialism, and the crises of postcolonial state building. Through a close examination of primary sources and historical arguments, this course explores history and memory, violence and trauma, identity and belonging, justice and reconciliation.

Qualifications

We are seeking applicants with mastery of the subject area as related to the course description above and teaching experience as a teaching assistant, with experience preparing and giving a guest lecture. Previous experience or training with Quercus is highly desirable. Previous experience in giving a guest lecture in or TAing a similar course is an asset.

Past teaching experience is the more relevant criterion than the need to acquire experience in respect of this posted position.
