The Soviet Union went through war, destruction, and chaos in the 1940s and the early 1950s. But for many of its citizens, this time was the prime of their lives, when they raised families, built careers, and made friends. These simple actions often required courage and forced people to make impossible choices, negotiate absurd rules, or laugh in the face of discrimination

Doris Bergen, Chancellor Rose and Ray Wolfe Professor of Holocaust Studies, and Ato Quayson, University Professor of English, will discuss the new book by Professor Anna Shternshis, When Sonia Met Boris: an Oral History of Jewish Life under Stalin (Oxford University Press, 2017). They are followed by singer-songwriter Psoy Korolenko and Anna Shternshis, who will present a lecture/concert program featuring Soviet Jewish stories, anecdotes, songs, and jokes in Russian and Yiddish. Sometimes sad, more often hilarious, always unforgettable, these narratives and artefacts transport us to the world of dilemmas, self-deprecating humour and controversies of the Soviet Jewish experience.
